


'The school celebrates the importance of being strong and faithful in everything pupils do. Pupils model these values through their positive behaviours in school. They demonstrate resilience and integrity in their learning. Pupils are polite and respectful to all members of the school community. When visitors arrive in classrooms, they are welcomed by pupils taking on the role of 'lead learner'. These pupils explain the theme of the lesson and how it links to what they have learned before. Pupils enjoy this responsibility. They are proud to explain their learning to others. Pupils, including sixth-form students, are happy in school. They enjoy learning. In lessons, they behave extremely well. They listen carefully to the expert input from their teachers and are keen to share their views at appropriate times. The school has high expectations for all pupils. They have carefully planned the curriculum to build pupils' knowledge over time. Pupils in all key stages understand connections between new learning and prior learning. There is a broad and varied enrichment offer, which includes a birdwatching club, a diversity club and a badminton club. Pupils and parents value these experiences and the opportunities these provide to develop pupils' talents and interests.'

Ski Trip

As we write the magazine the school is on a Ski Trip in Italy. They travelled by coach, across The Channel by ferry at Dover and passed by Lake Como and enjoyed the scenic journey.

Earlier in the year pupils hosted an exchange trip with a German School. The exchange pupils visited York and Sheffield Hallam. It was an interesting day learning about life in former East Germany.


Mark Bellwood Tatam (1950-2023)

I first got to know Mark when I moved into the boarding house of Brigg Grammar School in September 1962. We were both in the same form (Lower IVa) under 'Tigger' Richards. Like many of the boarders at that time. Mark was the son of a local farmer. He was neither athletic nor sports-minded but was more of an intellectual. He was always reading and had a wide range of interests. He enjoyed discussion and was a keen debater. He gained a place to read Philosophy, Politics and Economics at Christchurch College, Oxford. There he mixed with the aristocracy. Many of his contemporaries were titled. After his



time at Oxford he returned to Lincolnshire and took over the family farm when his father retired. Farming was in a state of flux particularly when the UK joined the European Union, but Mark took it all in his stride and diversified to keep pace with the changes.

In the late '70s he married a Scottish lass, Pamela, from a small town, Bridge of Weir, in Renfrewshire. They brought up a family of three children. For many years Pam ran a very successful market gardening business and their garden was something to enjoy at any time of the year. When the various barns and farm buildings were no longer required for their traditional purposes, Mark welcomed local artisans to occupy these spaces.



Mark and Pam have been big supporters of the arts in rural Lincolnshire and often hosted house concerts in their home. When Putin invaded Ukraine they offered their home as a refuge to a Ukrainian family. Mark was very community minded and will be greatly missed. I offer my condolences to Pamela and the family at this difficult time.

Please note that Peter Jarvis has died. His father was the Geography Master for many years.



Derek Sumpter 1943 - 1950

Very sadly Derek has died suddenly at the age of 89. He was from a long line of Sumpter families attending Brigg Grammar School as one of the 60 boarders. His father and three uncles had all attended BGS.

Derek, when in the Lower Sixth, had to leave the school after his father died of cancer at 47 to support his mother.

After a highly successful life in journalism spending 27 years with the Sunday Telegraph where he rose to become the Assistant Editor for News covering home and foreign news. Latterly he lived in Cornwall with his daughter but regularly attended the annual Dinner at Elsham Golf Club, a round trip of 750 miles, and would, whenever possible, play a round of golf there with Dave Brittain prior to the evening get together. Derek sent a message to Briggensians at the Dinner on the Saturday before he died that the president, John Hastings, read out to those assembled. He was the driving force behind the 40's group and kept everyone informed; he became a great friend of Dave's and will be greatly missed by him and so many

others.

Sadly, Derek had been unwell since Christmas and his health deteriorated over his last 3 weeks but his death was unexpected so soon. He was only diagnosed with cancer on the Thursday prior to his passing on the following Monday.

This must have been an awful shock for the family and I thank his daughter, Lydia Bailey, for her information. Derek's funeral was held on Wednesday 5th April at St John the Baptist Church, Mount Hawke. His grandsons wore his Old Briggensian ties in his honour.

Lydia added:

We've had rather a sad year actually as following my dear Dad's death, his cousin, **David Sumpter**, became ill & was diagnosed with aggressive lymphoma and he sadly passed away on Thursday, 19 October, in Crawley, West Sussex. He was a pupil at BGS in the 1940's & early 1950's I believe, being 6 years younger than my father. His career was in agriculture, in the agricultural chemical industry.

Mike Spencer let us know: David and I (together with people like John Furniss, John Henderson, John Rowley) joined BGS as boarders in September 1950.


Linda has been a family friend of ours for many years and lives in the same northern suburb of Perth as Maggie and I do.

The B.B.Q. was in early March 2023 and included a "few" drinks and a lot of reminiscing along with some other local Aussie friends.


Simon and Paul



My 2 year journey with the Big C

It was in March 2022 that I managed to get a GP appointment for a persistent sore throat. No infection was found so I was referred to Gastroenterology for investigation. 30th March 2022. After eight days I was at Scunthorpe Hospital for a throat and stomach camera-tube and biopsy. I was immediately diagnosed with throat cancer. On the 6th April I had a full body scan and then at ENT a camera check of the voice box which was clear and fascinating to watch.

The CT did not show any spread and so I was transferred to Castle Hill Hospital Queen's Centre for further assessment. Their CT scan showed that the cancer was inoperable so the choice was Radiotherapy or palliative care. I chose to take my chance at a longer life with Radiotherapy so a stoma feeding tube was fitted directly into my stomach on 23rd June 2022 because my throat would only be able to take fluids.

Weekly chemotherapy and weekday radiotherapy began on 14th July for 6 weeks (30 treatments) after which you get to ring the "end of treatment bell".

This is just the beginning of recovery from the brutal treatment; I was sent home with upper chest radiation burns, open sores and a mouth and throat full of ulcers. Now I knew why I needed a feeding tube. Mouth wash and special creams and plasters slowly did their job thanks to the dedicated nursing care of my wife Mickey. The frustration of loss of speech when you feel really poorly can also have it's funny side. Many men/partners complain that they haven't spoken to their wives for years, they can't get a word in edgeways. I had to write down anything I wanted to say to Mickey, visitors or telephone callers. We played a modern version of Chinese Whispers. Gradually my speech, taste and smell began to return and I could enjoy a glass of wine and a little solid food. Progress was carefully monitored and a CT scan showed just two small areas of uncertainty. One late freezing Sunday night in February 2023 my feeding tube became dislodged; the inflatable balloon that held it in place had burst. Off to Scunthorpe A&E to get a replacement before the opening closed after 2 to 3 hours. Neither the nurses nor duty GP were familiar with the system so I was not believed. After 2 hours wait and a threat to leave, the duty GP tried to poke a drain tube into the opening into my stomach and only succeeded after many attempts then taped it in place. It was a very painful and bloody 'white knuckle' experience. Specialist Nurses called the next day to replace the tube. I braced myself with clenched fists at the ready - out with the drain tube and in with the new feeding-feeding tube, completely painlessly. What a difference properly trained and experience nurses make. However, I didn't use it again, preferring to drink a watered down mixture of my high protein drinks.

It took until the 14th April for me to persuade them to remove my tube. Freedom! My recovery was checked with a PET scan (Proton Emission Tomography) using a short-lived radioactive tracer and no spread was found. The tracer collects in areas of high blood flow and will pinpoint cancers feeding. In late 2023 my Oncologist ordered a full body CT scan and this came along in mid-January 2024.

On 8th February 2024 my Specialist gave me the news that there wasn't a sign of cancer anywhere. Time to celebrate with a glass of wine or two and Mickey shed a tear of joy into her coffee! It has been a two-year journey along a bumpy road since it all began. Thanks to all those who have sent their best wishes and shown concern, I hope to have a few years left but behave more like an octogenarian if I can!!
