


Guest Speaker – Professor Sandy Trees (1957-1964)

Sandy Trees (BGS 1957-64) went up to Edinburgh University to study Veterinary Science in 1964 and for relaxation played football and went mountaineering.

His love of mountaineering led to him being made President of the Edinburgh University Mountaineering Club and becoming a member of the Squirrels Club. He continued playing football for many years until work became too intrusive.

Sandy's wife Fran is an Edinburgh graduate, they still enjoy the outdoor life together and own a cottage in Scotland for those rare occasions when they have time to go and pursue their love of the countryside and mountains. They have one daughter now 28 years old.

Sandy completed his Veterinary studies at Edinburgh University in 1969 and then worked in East Africa and Nigeria before completing his PhD in 1976.

He then worked for a veterinary products company having special responsibility for Africa, Turkey and the Middle East, rising to be Head of Animal Science.

In 1980 he was appointed to the Department of Veterinary Parasitology, Faculty of Veterinary Science, University of Liverpool, based in the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine and he remains there to this day.

Within the department he has risen from Lecturer, Senior Lecturer, Head of Parasitology, Chair of Veterinary Parasitology and finally became Dean of Faculty in 2001.

Sandy has published a vast number of papers and received splendid awards recognising his eminence in the field of Parasitology; he is in great demand and lectures widely and travels extensively.

He is particularly well known for his life changing work on the prevention of River Blindness in Africa, cattle fertility, the effect of horse tapeworms and the mapping of the major parasitic diseases of dogs and cats across Europe, although these form just part of his extensive workload.

Sandy is looking forward to renewing many of the friendships made during his time in Brigg and hopes that his old school friends and contemporaries will be able to join him at the Annual Dinner, swap stories and relive the 'good old days'.

Headteacher's Report 2006

The past year has been a very significant phase in the life of Sir John Nelthorpe School.

When I wrote the Headteacher's Report last year we were awaiting a visit from the Specialist Schools' Team to confirm that our bid had been successful. We had confirmation in March 2005. The school was privileged to be accepted as a centre of excellence for two subjects, Science and Mathematics (Computing is a compulsory part of the bid for all specialist colleges). When the Trust Team made their visit they were somewhat bemused by the collection of buildings which make up the school. I described them as 'unique' but they recorded them as 'bizarre and unusual'! As ever the facilities present a challenge to the staff that continue to provide excellent teaching and learning experience for the students.

The target for GCSE examinations in the summer of 2005 was that 60% of the year 11 pupils should achieve 5 or more passes at A*-C. We knew that this would be a real challenge with that particular year group. We managed to achieve a 59.4% pass rate – so near! Congratulations to all who worked so hard to maintain the high standards and expectations we have for our students.

The A level examination results achieved by students in the Upper Sixth were outstanding. We had a 100% pass rate in every subject. This was a first for Sir John Nelthorpe School, the Brigg Sixth Form and any post 16 establishment in the area. The results reflect the fact that we take great pains to match student aptitude and ability to the courses we offer. All students were entered for the courses they had followed. This is a great credit to the pastoral and teaching staff and to the students themselves.

In September the funds released by the specialist status bid began to impact on the fabric of the school. The Government capital grant of £100,000, combined with the £50,000 raised by the school and some money from the buildings budget have enabled us to make real progress. The Chemistry laboratory was completely refurbished by the end of December 2005 at a cost of £70,000. The Physics laboratory is currently being refurbished and it is anticipated that the work will be completed by early March. The cloakrooms on the Wrawby Road site have been converted into a Community Resource Centre for use by sixth form students and community groups. We also intend to offer staff development courses for our own staff and those from local primary schools. We have installed over thirty interactive white boards in classrooms to enhance the learning and teaching experience for students.

Other building work has taken place, which is not part of the Specialist Status bid. A new Music Room has been developed on the Grammar School Road site. The contract for converting the old dining rooms on the Wrawby Road site is currently out to tender as we have plans to convert them to a state of the art Geography suite. This will be an expensive project, as walls and old catering equipment have to be removed.

In order to ensure that the new resources and facilities are used to best effect we moved to a faculty based school rather than upper/lower school. Mathematics, Business Studies and Geography are now based on the Wrawby Road site. English, RE, History and MFL (French and German) are based on the Grammar School site. PE, Science, Art and Technology continue to be based on both sites because of the historical siting of specialist facilities. The availability of Science, Mathematics and ICT on the Wrawby Road site are essential as part of the specialist status provision as they are on the ground floor with disabled access. The site is also far easier to open to the public and secure at night.

Three days after we returned to school in January I received the dreaded Ofsted telephone call. Under the new 'Framework for Inspections' the school was only given 48 hours notice of a full inspection. The staff and pupils immediately rose to the challenge and spent what little time they had preparing for the visitors.

At the time of writing this report I have seen the draft inspection report but I am not allowed to publish any of it until the end of February. I will be able to give full details at the dinner in March. Local Briggensians will be able to read the accounts in the Nelthorpe News and the local press. There were no surprises in that the inspectors found the sixth form provision to be good, most teaching good with several staff achieving 'outstanding' grades and that the pupils were well behaved and conscientious.

Once again the school was hampered by the state of the buildings. Under the Government's 'Every Child Matters' agenda the 'learning environment' has become a significant part of the Inspection process. The Ofsted Inspectors suggested that more funding is required to bring the facilities up to 21st century standards. The lack of an up to date sports' hall and assembly facility were major criticisms. Unfortunately the Ofsted inspectors do not have the power to direct any finances to help us to rectify the situation. I am sure that the governors will use the inspection findings to make further requests for support from the LEA!

At the end of the summer term 2005 we said goodbye to Mr Stewart Hibbert who retired from his post of Head of Art and Advanced Skills Teacher. He also worked for one day a week in an advisory capacity with other schools. The LEA has

wisely decided to keep him as a part-time advisor so we still see him on a regular basis. The school has benefited a great deal from the 15 years he spent with us and he was instrumental in ensuring that Art at every level was a high profile, high achieving subject at Sir John Nelthorpe School as well as an area for personal fulfilment for students of all abilities. Last week Mr Andrew Williams who has been at Sir John Nelthorpe School since 1994 was appointed to the post of Headteacher at Howden School with effect from Easter 2006. As he has been my deputy for the past three years he will be a particular loss to the Leadership Team but we are all very proud and pleased for him. We have high ambitions for our staff as well as the students and we wish him every success for the future.

The Governors and Trustees have continued to be sources of great support to the school and to me as Headteacher. The Ofsted Inspectors were impressed with how well they knew the school and what the real challenges are. Finances and the buildings continue to be demanding and frustrating but by working together we are making steady progress on improving the learning experience for our students. I would like to thank them for their continued support.

I look forward to meeting those of you who would like to see the recent improvements at school from 2-4pm on the afternoon of Saturday, 18th March and even more of you at the dinner.



Editorial

“At the time of writing, we have seen the results of two by-elections in which people of my own age have been able to vote. I am sure that we all realise the power and responsibility that is now ours. Bearing this in mind, most political commentators have expressed surprise that our influence upon the two elections has not been greater than the statistics suggest. But surely there is no reason why our effect should be any greater than that of our parents: we are products of the same society and it is reasonable to suppose that we share the beliefs and prejudices of our elders. In short, the same proportion of young people will support the Left or the Right as is the case with the older voters.

Indeed, I believe that Youth will have a very small effect on elections. The real deciding factor in elections is the Floating Voter, however much he may be despised by the three main Political Parties. Young people tend to be far too intolerant and extreme in their views to be swayed by any aspiring demagogue, however plausible.

Shall we, then, see extremists borne to power by Youth? I think not. The new voters are a very small proportion of the total electorate. Thus the practical effect of granting suffrage to eighteen year olds will, I believe, be minimal and, therefore, cannot be seriously detrimental, whereas the moral advantage of having the right to vote can be only beneficial to young people.”

Mr. Walker is now in charge of the Library. Mr. David Adams will have leave of absence, next year, to attend a course at Hull University in which venture we all wish him success. Brigg Grammar School will also not wish to forget Miss Shepherdson whose appointment as Deputy Headmistress at Kidbrooke School is a real loss to us. We wish her all success. Those who knew the School a few years ago, or even last year, now find it difficult to find their way in and even, sometimes, to know their way about. This is a consequence of the new building — Staff Room and laboratory — with which we are well-pleased. Unfortunately, the later instalments, of which this was to have been the first, are failing to materialise. We are continuing our tradition of self-help, most notably symbolised, of course, by the Swimming Bath, and hope that during the coming year work will start on a Scout Hut which, in due course, will bring a new-look to the field. We have also acquired a part interest in the house, 'Oakleigh', next-door to us and we expect that changes in that quarter of the School's grounds will take place, before long. The main drive of the School which had been damaged during the building operations will have been replaced during the Easter holidays. This will enable us to present a slightly more cared-for image to the world."


John Hastings has recently spoken to **Walter Cash (1927-33)** who said he is now in his 42nd year of retirement!

Obituaries

Raymond (Doggy) Barker Old Boys of the former Brigg Grammar School have been saddened to learn of the death of former teacher Ray Barker, who was 87. Mr Barker joined the staff of the school shortly after coming out of the Royal Air Force in which he served during the 2nd World War. He remained at the school throughout the 1950's and 60's and taught German and French. For a short while, before retirement he became the school's Deputy Head. He was typical of schoolmasters of his generation, quiet yet firm with discipline and had a genuine care for his students. Mr Barker was at one time a member of the former Glanford Players.

Vernon Atkin was a colleague in those days:

"Ray had a very keen mind and was responsible for getting German into the curriculum as an exam subject. He was a good colleague to work with, a keen sportsman and a quick runner in his younger days. He used to play soccer and helped with athletics."

He may be particularly remembered for being master in charge of hockey. Several 1st team captains of Brigg were introduced to the game including John Holland, Val Jeffrey and Peter Thompson.

Peter Thompson recalled:

"'Doggy' - as he was affectionately known used to have a big green camper van and we all used to pile in to travel to games. When we played adult sides he used to play in the team and when the old school shirt he wore became too tatty we clubbed together and bought him a new one. He was a quiet sincere chap - and many of us owe a love of the game to the fact that he got us started."

Mr Barker is survived by his wife Mary, one son George and two daughters Jane and Celia. He moved to Strete near Dartmouth a year ago. His funeral was held at Torquay Crematorium. **PETER THOMPSON**

Mr Barker – a personal viewpoint:

Most people can remember one teacher in particular many years after they have left school. For me, that teacher was Mr Barker. He taught the very first lesson I ever had at BGS – French with 3B in the wooden classroom between the old Biology lab and the swimming pool. Although I remember him most for German, which became my favourite subject, it was in French lessons in our first two years at school that we got to know Mr Barker better when he illustrated his lessons with anecdotes about his war service in France. He brought German to life and had beautifully simple ways of demystifying the rules of German grammar, which I found most useful in the seven years I worked in Germany. What many Old Boys

will remember Mr Barker for, even if they were never taught French or German by him, were the Friday evening hockey sessions that he ran. When you consider that we played on the 2nd XI soccer pitch in front of School House, complete with long grass and bumpy mud, and that he had little encouragement from some quarters, it is a wonder that we ever became good enough to play competitive matches, but we did. There were no other schools playing hockey in our area so we cut our teeth – quite literally sometimes – playing the likes of Brigg and Appleby Frodingham 2nd XIs and H.M. Borstal at Hatfield. The journeys to matches in his old green mini-bus were crowded but happy affairs.

Mr Barker only failed to do two things as far as I was concerned. One was to get me to do a forward roll in PE. The other was to teach me to ask for a haircut in German – the syllabus he had to teach was more concerned with Goethe and Schiller than such mundane practicalities. Mr Barker was one of the many good teachers BGS had over the years. His philosophy was simple - everything is possible if you try hard enough – and if you did his support for you was whole-hearted. Many boys like me had cause to be grateful for that attitude. Thank you, Mr Barker, for your friendship and example. **TED COX**

Philip Wood (1941-1949). Councillor Philip Wood, a former pupil and foundation governor of Brigg Grammar School died at the age of 72 following a short illness. A Conservative councillor of more than 40 years, he served the Ridge Ward with distinction whilst living in Hibaldstow. His involvement as a governor at Brigg Grammar School was particularly busy as he was a member during the change over period between Grammar School and Sir John Nelthorpe School.

He was originally elected to Brigg District Council in 1963 and was Mayor of Glanford Borough Council, its successor in 1977 at the time of the Queens Jubilee visit, and was awarded the Queens Silver Medal as a consequence. He became the Councils leader from 1993 to 1996. He was also a member of Humberside County Council from 1985. More recently, he served as Mayor for North Lincolnshire Council in 2004-5, during which he raised £12,880 for the Scunthorpe Support Group for Diabetes – a condition from which he also suffered.

His life outside of local and county council was wide and varied. His first passion was as a cricketer, playing for the Lincoln Ramblers, a team based around Lincoln consisting of bankers and farmers, and latterly as a member of Yorkshire County Cricket Club. His second was perhaps in earlier years, as a supporter of Lincoln City Football Club in the heady days of the second division. He was a member of Brigg Lions and its president in 1979-80, a charter member of Glanford and Lindsey Lions and their President in 97-98, also a member of the very successful Twinning Committee with Gifhorn in Germany. In total a Lion member for more than 30 years. Other responsibilities were Parish Council Chairman, Governor of Hibaldstow Primary School, Huntcliffe School, Kirton in Lindsey and John Leggott College. He was also Chair of Hibaldstow Playing Fields Committee.

During the last 15 years, his new found passion was travel and could be found at least twice a year on the high seas cruising, particularly the Atlantic, Baltic and Mediterranean, or perhaps travelling overland, as a Lion or member of Glanford Council to Gifhorn.

Philip Wood is survived by his wife Dorene and seven daughters.

David Riggall (1920-1931) David's daughter Roseanne wrote to say that David died in 2000 aged 87 and passed onto his family a fantastic legacy of memoirs about his life. Part of his writings concerned his time living in Great Coates and his memories of life and people boarding at Brigg Grammar School. As a young man he spent some time working in a munitions factory in Cumbria and then teaching at various schools there.

His memoirs of time at BGS will be put on the web soon or **can be obtained from Sir John Nelthorpe School or Dave Brittain by email.**

F. Maurice. A. Proctor (1938 -1946). Maurice died in March 2005 and will be remembered by many as an able BGS sportsman who won the 'Nelthorpe Bat', a prestigious award that is still treasured by his family. He served in the army in Palestine and worked for Platts before joining Lincoln City Police Force. Maurice later joined the family haulage firm of FF Proctor.

Joy Lowther (nee Hastings). We sadly report the death of Joy Lowther; after a short illness resulting in an emergency operation Joy (45) passed away on March 3rd 2004.

She attended Glebe Road School where her Mum and elder Sister Elizabeth were both on the teaching staff. During those early years many friendships were made and the links with Jane (Lancaster), Julie (Dent) and Joy became well known. In their last year they were all taught under the guidance of Briggensian John Holland.

On arriving at the Girls High School some friendships continued over “the fence” with the likes of David Stocks and Dean Nutbrown. Joy also met Sally Robinson (later to become Sally Rodgers). Sally became a dear lifelong friend and later a trusted business partner. Joy’s days at B.G.H.S. were enjoyable and memorable. She enjoyed her time to the full including foreign holidays and her near-fatal field trip. (Liz Jefferson was the rugby tackling teacher who saved her.)

On leaving the 6th Form Joy joined her Mum (now retired from teaching) in the family business and during this time met her husband to be –Tom. George, Henry, Edward and William were the most wanted gifts in Joy’s life and the “Little Kings” made her very proud. Today George is in the joint 6th Form, Henry and Edward in Upper School and William to arrive next September into Lower School.

Joy made lots of friends through sporting activities in which the boys participated and most of these joined other friends (including Briggensians, pupils and staff from S.J.N., pupils and staff from St. Mary’s School) along with all the family members at the Methodist Church where Rev. Janet Magee conducted the service on March 12th 2004.

Family thanks go out to everyone who gave much needed support and comfort during this very sad time and to all of you who continue to help Tom, George, Henry, Edward and William in so many ways.

June 2005: Rounders

Briggensians were put into bat by school skipper Joe Hebblewhite on a perfect night for cricket, with strong sun but a cooling breeze. Perhaps it was the artificial strip, rather than traditional grass, but Briggensians did not make the best of starts, in the face of some good school catching and ground-fielding but a recovery was soon made. Richard Antcliffe, of Grimsby Town CC in the Lincs ECB League, made 36 before retiring to rest up for the following day's game, and Lee Fielden (Brigg Town CC) played the anchor role with 24. Late acceleration then took Briggensians to 145 for six in their 14 eight-ball overs.

This score was going to take some beating, but tight early bowling applied pressure.

So much so that School opener, Luke McMillan, was forced into attempting a reverse sweep, only to lose his leg stump to Old Boys' skipper Nigel Fisher, now retired from club cricket after 30 years with Brigg and serving on the Scunthorpe umpires' panel.

Off-spinner Fisher retired to the outfield to rest his bad back and when ace bowler Willey replaced him, things really began to happen. First he induced a mishit to midwicket where Tom Daniels (ex-Brigg and Appleby-Frodingham) held a sharp chance.

Then, the very next ball, he found the edge and Hastings held what, for him, was a regulation catch at slip.

Another wicket in David's next over, coupled with two suicidal run-outs, meant it was all over bar the shouting, despite Danny Dewfall's attempts to keep the scoreboard ticking along.
