Guest Speaker – The Very Reverend David Leaning 1947-1955

David retired after 46 years serving in the Church of England's Ministry in Gainsborough, Worsop in Nottinghamshire and Kington in Herefordshire.

After 20 years in Parish Ministry he became Archdeacon of Newark in the Diocese of Southwell and then Dean of the Cathedral of Southwell, a position he held for 15 years.

At Southwell they encouraged artists and craftsmen to provide inspirational works of art in addition to their work maintaining the fabric of the (mainly) 12^{th} and 13^{th} century buildings. A new refectory and shop now provides hospitality for the many visitors during the year. 'Time Travelling' ~ a project for Junior School children brings 7,500 children into the Cathedral each year.

For 25 years David was a Trustee of an Adventure Centre for young people in the Lake District and regularly he provided 'Open Forums' for Sixth Formers in his home whilst Dean at Southwell.

He was a School Governor of Worksop College for many years and is a Fellow of the Woodard Corporation; Woodard Schools form the largest group of Church of England schools in England and Wales. Of the forty schools in the United Kingdom which are currently part of the Corporation, twenty-three are owned directly by the Woodard Corporation.

David continues as a Patron of the Emmaus Trust in Newark; this is an independent registered charity, which aims to help local single and homeless people from 16 to 25 years old. The Trust was set up in 1992 by the Newark Council of Churches.

David was recently invited to serve on the Board of the Lincoln Mystery Plays Company which is famous for the production of medieval biblical plays. He also continues his work with Retreat Houses and conducts 'Quiet Days and Rehab' plus helping Clergy and others with spiritual guidance. However, still finds time and energy to conduct services whenever invited to do so.

So much for 'retirement'!!!!

However, congratulations go to Jane Gibbons who has been appointed Chair for the next two years; how appropriate as we prepare to celebrate the 70th year of the High School on Wrawby Road.

Second, we have again lost a few older members to the Heavenly Briggensians division and the flow of new registrations has slowed slightly but I am pleased with our overall performance this year and I am sure we can look forward to a particularly good year in 2006/7 with the Annual Dinner, High School Celebration and sporting events already booked.

Headteacher's Report 2007

When I wrote my report last year the school had just undergone an Ofsted Inspection and we were awaiting the publication of the final report. I gave the highlights at last year's dinner but for those who were not able to attend I will repeat the main findings.

The teachers in several subject areas were considered to be good or very good. The Inspectors did not find any unsatisfactory teaching. The school was also recognised as having good overall provision for the 'personal development and well being of the students'. This is a positive reflection on the Heads of Year and all staff who act as form tutors and support staff. The Sixth Form provision was rated as good which is reassuring in the present climate as the government is keen to close small school sixth forms. The school Governors were also considered to be 'discharging their responsibilities' in an effective manner'. The students' behaviour and attitude to learning were praised.

The areas the Inspectors identified for improvement were to do with target setting and monitoring. Since last year this has been a major focus for staff development. The school has invested in a SERCO management system, which had just started last January. It has enabled us to enter pupil data, including targets, so that pupils can be monitored closely on an individual basis. As every teacher has a laptop this enables instant access to management and academic data.

As usual the school buildings have been a constant source of concern and expense. The Inspectors insisted that several areas were addressed immediately which somewhat drained the coffers of the maintenance fund. Unfortunately, the drains under the main drive and original school building decided to collapse the day before the Inspectors arrived. They were very expensive to repair as were the boilers, which broke down on the first day of the Inspection. The Governors have made frequent representation to the Local Authority and our M.P. regarding the funding of the school with regard to the buildings, as yet to no avail.

Despite budgetary constraints we have managed to make major improvements to several areas of the school. The dining room on Wrawby Road has been completely refurbished to provide a Geography suite with its own ICT facilities. The library has had new computers provided through the fundraising of our PTA. The hall has had new lighting installed and public areas have been redecorated. Improvements have been made to the science laboratory. New hardware has been purchased for one of the ICT rooms.

On the Grammar School Road site the two Biology Laboratories have been completely refurbished which means that six laboratories have been fully completed in the last four years. The cloakrooms were gutted in order to provide a Music Room suitable for Music Technology.

On a sad note the tuck shop closed in October 2006 on the retirement of Mrs Carol Hedison who had worked in the boarding house for many years. After its closure she took charge of the tuck shop. She had worked at the school for almost 30 years. She will be missed.

The examination results this year were mixed. The sixth form achieved a very respectable 93% pass rate with students going on to a wide variety of courses. Recruitment to the sixth form was very good this year with 45 students enrolling in the lower 6^{th} . This gives us a very healthy total of 85 students, which is the highest we have had for several years.

The GCSE pass rate of 5 or more A*-C was 55%, which was lower than expected as the target was 60%. It is interesting to note however that the school came 3^{rd} in the new league table including English and Mathematics. 52% of the students passed 5 or more GCSE exams including these very important subjects. The Local Authority average is 38.5%. Sir John Nelthorpe School has not gone down the road of using 'equivalent' qualifications to boost results.

Last Easter we said goodbye to Andrew Williams who had taught at Sir John Nelthorpe School since 1994. He had been deputy head for his last three years and left to become Headteacher at Howden School. In September we welcomed Martin Evington as his replacement. Martin originally trained as a PE specialist but now teaches Science. He is in charge of the Wrawby Road site and is quickly settling in to the life of the school.

This year sees the 70^{th} anniversary of the opening of the Girls' High School building on Wrawby Road. To commemorate this we are holding a special reunion on the afternoon of 30^{th} June. We hope that as many ex students and staff as possible

will attend. Anyone who has items of uniform (from any era), photographs, reports or exercise books they could donate for display purposes should contact the school or Barbara Kernon, secretary to the Briggensians' Association.

I am pleased to welcome the very reverend David Leaning back to Sir John Nelthorpe School. He has agreed to lead the re designation of the swimming pool on the afternoon of the 24th March. The school will be open from 2-4pm but those who wish to participate in the re designation service should gather at the swimming pool at 3pm. I hope to see many of you there and many more at the evening event.

I would like to thank the Governors for their continued support of the school. School governance continues to be demanding and at times confusing and frustrating. The government expects a great deal from the individuals who give up their time, on a voluntary basis, to support the running of the school. I do appreciate their advice! In 2007 we will be celebrating 70 years since the opening of the new High School building on Wrawby Road.

The foundation stone was laid in 1936 and the new building opened officially on 2nd November 1937 by **Miss G E Hadow M.A** (Principal of the Society Of Oxford Home Students) The building replaced the existing 'school' which was housed in a number of wooden huts placed in a small site adjoining the Vicarage.

Miss Lardelli, the Headmistress who was a driving force behind the plans for the new building, sadly died in 1935 before it was opened. She is buried in Brigg.



A BLAST FROM THE PAST -extracts from The Brigg High School History 1919-46.

[']Coming from such a large rural area where there had previously been no secondary education for girls, it will be easily realized that the school was a very "mixed bag" as far as the girls' previous education went, and it must have been quite a feat to strike a happy mean which would enable all to make as rapid progress as possible. In a good many subjects, of course, this meant starting right from the very beginning, especially in mathematics and languages, even in the case of the Upper Division, whose upper age limit reached 15 to 16. But somehow or other it was achieved, and the Upper Division, later the Fifth Form, were able to enter as an entire form for the School Leaving Certificate, then the Cambridge Senior, only three years after the opening of the school.' **Gwen Dent**

'Looking back on the days of the wooden huts the chief thing that comes to my mind is the friendliness. Somehow it seemed very easy to go to school when one's buildings had such a delightful individuality. The fact that many of those same individualities were highly inconvenient and sometimes actively unpleasant, in no way detracted from the general air of a happy makeshift. On my first day I remember feeling a kind of homeliness in the sound of the saws from Phillips' yard next door.' **Mavis Thompson 1930 – 1937**

'Our New School! It embodied all our ideas of what a school should be really like. Unlike the Old School there was a well equipped Gymnasium, in which the bolder spirits could challenge each other to deeds of daring on ropes and parallel bars until the Gym Mistress appeared upon the scene to redirect the energy of her charges into more orthodox channels.... Instead of travelling over the road to take our Science lessons, we now possessed an excellently equipped laboratory. One of my favourite occupations, I regret to say, was testing the effect of various acids upon my overalls - entirely unofficial of course.... Three tennis courts next to the school and a hockey pitch on the doorstep. What an improvement on the old state of affairs!...... We even boasted an aquarium, internal heating in the walls, and electric clocks - but most important of all, there was a lovely mechanical potato-peeler, carefully installed in the kitchen. **Anon**

THE VERY REVEREND DAVID LEANING 1947-1955. David retired as Dean of Southwell Minster at the end of August 2006 and was given a splendid send off by the Church.

The Sung Eucharist to celebrate the ministry of all God's people and to mark the retirement of David was held on Sunday 16 July 2006 and was a spectacular occasion attended by a host of dignitaries including Brian and Margaret Williams, Peter Wade, Michael Spencer and Roy, Margaret and Julian O'Neill (David had Christened and Married Julian and Christened Julian's two children in Southwell Minster).

Following his announcement the Bishop of Southwell, the Rt. Rev'd George Cassidy, said: "David Leaning is held in the highest esteem and affection throughout every part of the diocese. He has served faithfully here as incumbent, Archdeacon and for the past 14 years as Dean of Southwell. As Bishop, he has been to me, a wise counsellor and friend and to both Jane and myself, a most kind and caring neighbour."

But there was only 1 prize to present, so instead of delving into higher maths it was decided to make equal 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} .


